

Hydrocodone/Homatropine

(hye-droe-**koe**-done/hoe-**ma**-tro-peen)

Key Information

- This medication is an opioid cough suppressant.
- Giving with food may help prevent stomach upset
- Do not give with other pain or fever-reducing medications unless specifically instructed by your veterinarian.
- Common side effects include drowsiness, constipation, decreased appetite, and vomiting.
- Contact your veterinarian immediately if you notice continual vomiting or diarrhea or complete loss of appetite.
- This medication is a highly regulated controlled substance.
 - Store it in a secure spot out of sight.
 - It must only be used in the animal it was prescribed for. It is illegal to give or sell it to anyone else.

Description	 Opioid cough suppressant Available as a tablet or a syrup
Other common names	Hycodan, Tussigon, Hydromet
Uses	This medication is not FDA approved specifically for animals, but it is approved for use in humans. At the discretion of your veterinarian, this medication may be used extra-label as:A cough suppressant in dogs
Before this medication is given	 No medication is 100% safe in all patients. Discuss with your veterinarian: Any other medications or supplements your animal is taking Any conditions or diseases your animal has now or has had in the past Any side effects your animal has had to medications in the past The risks of using this medication if your animal is pregnant or nursing
Warnings for animals	 Do not use in patients that: Are allergic to hydrocodone, homatropine, or other related medications Have diarrhea caused by exposure to a toxic substance Use with caution in animals: With an unknown cause of coughing That are old, weak, or frail With a head injury With severe thyroid, heart, lung, kidney, or adrenal diseases That are working or service animals. They may become too tired to perform their duties. Certain medications are not allowed in some animal competitions. Check rules and regulations when your animal is taking a medication.
Warnings for humans	 Wash your hands after handling any medication. This medication is a controlled substance that must only be used in the animal that it was prescribed for. It is illegal to give or sell it to anyone else.
How do I give this medication?	 Give with or without food. Food may help prevent stomach upset. Measure liquids using an oral syringe, medicine cup, or dosing spoon. Do not use household measuring devices. Do not give more than your veterinarian prescribes.

	 Do not give with any other pain or fever-reducing medications unless your veterinarian specifically tells you to.
	Give exactly as your veterinarian has prescribed. Always follow the instructions on the prescription label.
Side effects	 Common - contact your veterinarian if any of these signs are severe, continue to occur, or worsen over time: Drowsiness or low energy level Constipation
	 Itching Decreased appetite Vomiting Severe - stop the medication and contact your veterinarian immediately if you notice any of these signs: Complete loss of appetite Vomiting or diarrhea that continues to occur
How will I know it's working?	 A change in your animal's breathing Your animal should start feeling better in 1 to 2 hours. Contact your veterinary clinic if your animal's symptoms worsen or do not improve.
How long will the medication effects last?	 This medication will stop working within 12 hours of the last dose. It may last longer if your animal has reduced kidney or liver function.
How long do I give it for?	 This medication can be given for different lengths of time. It is important to give it for as long as your veterinarian tells you. This medication is a highly regulated controlled substance. Your veterinarian cannot add refills to the prescription. If you need more medication, your veterinarian must write a new prescription. If this medication is used for a long period, it needs to be discontinued gradually over time. Stopping it suddenly can cause side effects from withdrawal. Talk with your veterinarian before stopping it.
Overdose	 Signs of overdose may include either sedation or hyperactivity, uncoordinated movement, vocalizing, very slow breathing, and vomiting. If you witness or suspect an overdose, call your veterinarian or an animal-specific poison control center (consultation fee applies): ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center: (888) 426-4435 Pet Poison Helpline: (855) 764-7661 Have the product or label with you if possible.
Missed dose	 In most cases, if you miss a dose: Give it when you remember, then return to the regular dosing schedule. If it is close to the time for the next dose: Skip the missed dose. Give the next dose at the next scheduled time. Continue the regular dosing schedule. If you are unsure, call your veterinary clinic. Do not double-up or give extra doses.
Storage	Store in the original container at room temperature.Protect from light.

	Keep out of reach of children and animals.Because this medication is a controlled substance, store it in a secure spot that is out of sight.
Disposal	 Because this medication is a controlled substance, dispose of any unused medication as soon as possible. Options for disposing of unused or expired medications include: <u>Drug take-back sites</u>: This is preferred whenever possible. To find a site near you, contact your local law enforcement or waste management authorities. <u>Home disposal</u>: Unlike most medications, this medication should be flushed down the toilet. <i>Do not</i> save leftover medication or give it to others to use.
